9.	Halfway through the poem (line 11) is the line 'But out of the woods as night grew cool'. Using evidence from the text, give three ways in which the second half of the poem contrasts with the first half.			
	The first half of the poem is peaceful and still (water is flat, star is reflected). In the second half of the poem the arrival of the pig disturbs the peace with noise and movement (line 13). In the second half of the poem the pool no longer reflects the face of the star because the water is disturbed and moving ('churned', 'gurgled', 'splashed', 'mud'). The time has moved from 'evening glow' (line 1) to 'as night (grew cool)' (line 11).
