- Solve problems involving addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.
- Compare & order fractions whose denominators are all multiples of the same number.
- Recognise mixed numbers & improper fractions & convert from one form to the other
- Add and subtract fractions with the same denominator.
- Round decimals with one decimal place to nearest whole number.
- Measure and calculate the perimeter and area of composite shapes in cm & metres
- Solve problems involving converting between units of time
- Identify 3d shapes, including cubes and other cuboids, from 2d representations
- Know angles are measured in degrees: estimate & compare acute, obtuse & reflex angles.
- Complete, read and interpret information in tables, including timetables.
