In this pack, you will find instructions on how to complete your English lessons for this week.

Lesson 1 - Active & Passive voice

Active Voice

In an active sentence, the **subject** performs the **action** (the verb) to the **object**.

Passive Voice

In a passive sentence, the thing that would normally be the **object** gets turned into the **subject** through the use of the passive form of the verb. They often include a prepositional phrase starting with 'by'.

Active	The magician pulled a rabbit from the hat. Issac threw a ball at the window. Helen practised her recorder every day.	
Passive	The plane is boarded by the family. The damage was caused by the storm. The flowers were grown by my nan.	

It is possible to change a sentence from active to passive voice, or from passive to active voice. It is important that you do not change the tense of the sentence. Have a go at altering these sentences:

On the plain, the lioness chased an antelope. **On the plain, an antelope was chased by the lioness.**

Lesson 2 - Direct speech & Reported/ Indirect speech

Remember that Direct speech is "EXACTLY" what was said and is in inverted commas. Reported speech is a summary of what has been said and does not need inverted commas.

E,g

Look at this photograph. Can you invent both a direct and an indirect speech sentence based upon it?



Example Sentences

Direct Speech

"I want an ice cream!" shouted the angry little boy.

Indirect Speech

The angry little boy shouted that he wanted an ice cream.



Example Sentences

Direct Speech

"Say cheese, dad, " pleaded the girl as she was taking the photograph.

Indirect Speech

As she was taking the photograph, the girl pleaded for her dad to say cheese.


