Introduction - why are you writing this balanced argument?	
Reasons FOR deforestation - make sure you explain your reasons and give evidence	
Reasons AGAINST deforestation - make sure you explain your reasons and give evidence	
Conclusion – weigh up the evidence and give YOUR OWN OPINION.	

Balanced argument success criteria:

- ✓ Written in a formal style
- √ Structured using paragraphs
- \checkmark Written in the 3^{rd} person.
- ✓ Conclusion includes writers OWN opinion and is written in 1st person.
- ✓ Evidence to 'back up' points.
- ✓ Equal amount of points for and against
- ✓ It is interestingly written
- ✓ It includes year 6 punctuation such as: brackets, colons, dashes and commas to separate clauses.
